

Subject: Summary regarding NWB4SOU9800

Dear Ms. Becker

I am pleased to submit the summary report regarding the 2000 caribou harvest on Southampton Island. The harvest camp was situated approximately 25 miles northwest of Coral Harbour and camp mobilization was initiated around Feb 11 and demobilization was completed by Mar 31.

Water Use

Water for camp use was obtained from the lake by means of a pail through an 8" hole which was augured through the ice. Approximately 350 gals of water per day were used during the 21 operating days. Water use was for drinking, cooking, abattoir sterilizers and kitchen wash-up.

Waste Disposal Activities

An incinerator was used for paper, which was located 100 meters from the lake. Kitchen gray water was disposed of by dumping more than 30 meters from the high water level. Blackwater was collected in honey bucket bags and taken to Coral Harbour and placed in an authorized dumping area. All waste that could not be incinerated was removed to the landfill in Coral Harbour. The offal obtained during the harvest was widely spread over high ground more than 100 meters from the lake.

Abandonment & Restoration

The site was abandoned on or about March 31, 2000 and the various camp equipment was removed to the Coral Harbour storage facilities. As there was no movement of soil or rock the site was left as we found it on completion of the harvest.

Spills

There no spills to report.

I trust this report is satisfactory.
