A. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On July 16, 2013 the Nunavut Water Board provided notification to Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada (AANDC) that Natalie Plato, on behalf of AANDC (formerly Indian and Northern Affairs Canada) had submitted a Cancellation application for a Type B water licence, No. 1BR-BEA1015. The submitted information is as follows:

- 1. Letter to NWB Cover Letter Application
- Appendix 1 Remediation Completion Report
- 3. Appendix 2 AANDC Inspector Re Closure
- 4. Application for Water Licence Cancellation
- 5. Signed Application

Bear Island is approximately 5 km long, north to south, by 1.5 km wide. It is a low lying black basalt outcrop covered with small lakes and ponds which were created by glacial scouring. Two Doppler radar stations operated on Bear Island from the 1950s to 1965 as part of the former Mid-Canada Early Warning Line. They were abandoned in 1965 without any cleanup operations although the majority of the buildings were removed to their foundations. The environmental issues at Bear Island included former



landfills and site buildings as well as abandoned hazardous materials (lead acid batteries, petroleum products, asbestos) barrels, and scrap metal.

During 2010 remedial work began and was mostly completed at the site. In 2011 the remaining clean-up and demobilization activities were completed.

The licence expires on May 1, 2015 with the application for cancellation submitted to the NWB on May 31, 2013.

Interested parties were requested to review the information and provide comments by August 16, 2013.

B. RESULTS OF REVIEW

On behalf of AANDC, the following comments/ recommendations are submitted to the Nunavut Water Board for consideration:

1. Application For Water Licence Cancellation

- AANDC notes that as stated in the licence Part K: Conditions Applying to the Monitoring Program "The Licensee shall submit to the Board for approval by March 31, 2012, a Post-Closure Monitoring Plan for the site that includes the long term monitoring of Waste Disposal Facilities addressing water quality monitoring, stability and the requirement for thermal monitoring and ground water monitoring." It is understood that this is no longer required as all of the project waste was removed from the site. However AANDC recommends that the proponent submit to the NWB documentation regarding the removal of all wastes from the site before a cancellation determination is made.
- Once the NWB has absolved the licensee from their obligations described in Part K of the Licence 1BR-BEA1015, AANDC finds the cancellation application complete and recommends that the licence not be cancelled until a Water Resource Officer completes an on-site inspection and provides confirmation that no compliance issues are associated and/or remain outstanding with the project.
