Re: Environmental Concerns, Pelly Bay DEW Line Site

At the last Annual General Meeting of the Kitikmeot Health Board on September 30, 1995, you expressed your community's concerns with respect to environmental contaminants at the Pelly Bay DEW Line Site. I have made a few enquiries into this matter, and have summarized my findings as follows...

The Royal Roads Military College conducted an environmental assessment of the DEW Line Site in Pelly Bay in 1992. I have enclosed a copy of the report for your information. I recently contacted Ken Reimer in Kingston whose group conducted the assessment and authored the report. As you can see from his comments in the attached letter to me, the concentration of PCB's in the soil at the building trains and in the vicinity of Barrow Lake is minimal, and is located some distance from the community. However, to address the concerns of the community regarding contaminants in the drinking water, samples will be collected for analysis in the near future. I will keep you informed of the results.

Although the levels of contamination at the Pelly Bay DEW Line Site are low, the site is scheduled for a complete clean up. According to Shawn Bindon of the National Defence DEW Line Clean Up Program, this is to take place sometime between the year 2000 and 2003.

The Mackenzie Regional Health Services and the Kitikmeot Health Board have been looking at what types of contaminants may be found in mothers and babies in the Mackenzie and Kitikmeot regions. Women who delivered their babies at Stanton Yellowknife Hospital volunteered to participate in the program which consisted of taking a small amount of blood from the mother and umbilical cord. The results indicate that most program participants showed some levels of contaminants in their blood but this was to be expected as there is pollution all over the world. It must be stressed that there are no known health

effects at these low levels and that most of the pollution comes from other parts of the globe. I have enclosed Community Newsletter #2 which should answer any questions you might have about the program. The preliminary results of the monitoring will be released in the coming weeks, and a technical report, early in the new year.
