Dear Eva,

I am the Geologist who supervised Eureka camp (N67°01′33.7″ / W113°39′04.6″) in 2011 during its final use before it was permanently closed and removed that year. As part of my role, I was in charge of making sure camp was kept clean and maintained in good order. You recently inspected the camp-site and sent us a copy of your inspection report along with some concerns. Your inspection report says you visited the camp-site July 4th, 2013.

I was in Yellowknife last week and was able to fly up to the old Eureka camp-site September 18th, 2013, and address the concerns mentioned in your report. I picked up the garbage you identified during your inspection (see Photos 1 & 2 below), refilled the sump (Photos 3 & 4), and re-stacked the core which had been knocked over by a bear (Photos 5 through 8). No signs of fuel contamination were seen.

You and I had a phone conversation yesterday afternoon where I explained to you that because I was the Geologist last in charge of Eureka camp, I myself went to the old camp-site to personally make sure all of your concerns were taken care of. I also explained over the phone that no core boxes were ever moved from their original stacks (see Photos 5 through 8 below), and that there were no fuel spills.

Regarding the old drums mentioned on page 6 of your report, a Stornoway representative visited Eureka camp July 21st, 2009, and reported after inspecting the drums that none were leaking or showed any signs of leakage. A letter summarising this visit was sent to John Craig (DINA) by email August 25th, 2009, and by hard copy to Phyllis Beaulieu (NWB) August 28th, 2009. When I arrived in camp in 2011, I saw no leaking drums or signs of contamination, and all drums were back-hauled to Yellowknife that summer.

Page 2 of your report also mentions two empty fuel drums labelled "Tahera" and "Northwest Rotors" seen on a nearby island with small amounts of garbage and an old camp-fire. As the labels on the drums indicate, these drums are not ours. The garbage and old camp-fire are also not ours, and we never saw them while working up there in 2011. I tried to find this small island with the drums on it last week when I was up there but could not. The only coordinates given in your inspection report are for Eureka camp, and I did not see any drums on the islands we flew over.

The following photos should address the concerns mentioned in your report Eva, and I feel that the old Eureka camp-site is now fully clean. As such, I would like to request the closure of licences 2BE-COR0608 and 2BE-CGP1012. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me at the info below.
