Re: Application Acknowledgement for the Canadian Wildlife Service – Jennie Rausch’s Amendment for the “Arctic Shorebird Monitoring Program” Project

Dear Jennie Rausch:

On May 7, 2013 the Nunavut Impact Review Board (NIRB or Board) received an application from the Canadian Wildlife Service (CWS) for a Bird Sanctuary permit and a National Wildlife Area Entry permit for the “Arctic Shorebird Monitoring Program” project (previous CWS permits granted for this work included file numbers NUN-NWA-11-03 and NWT-MBS-09-03). On February 19, 2008 and April 24, 2013 the NIRB received a positive conformity determination (Keewatin Regional Land Use Plan) from the Nunavut Planning Commission (NPC) for this file. Previously the NIRB had also received a positive conformity determination (North Baffin Regional Land Use Plan) on May 26, 2011 in association with this project.

Please be advised that the original project proposal (NIRB File No.: 08YN017) was received by the NIRB from the CWS on February 19, 2008 and was screened by the Board in accordance with Part 4, Article 12 of the Nunavut Land Claims Agreement (NLCA). On April 2, 2008 the NIRB issued the enclosed NLCA 12.4.4(a) screening decision to the Minister of Environment, Government Canada, allowing the project to proceed subject to the NIRB's recommended project-specific terms and conditions.

This project is also related to Canadian Wildlife Service - Vicky Johnston's "CWS Ground Surveys of Breeding Shorebirds in QMGBS" project (NIRB File No.: 05AN070) which was screened in accordance with Part 4, Article 12 of the NLCA and on June 5, 2005, the Board issued a NLCA 12.4.4(a) screening decision to the Minister of Environment, Government of Canada, which indicated that the project could proceed subject to the NIRB's recommended project-specific terms and conditions.

As previously screened by the NIRB (File No. 08YN017), the “Arctic Shorebird Monitoring Program” project was originally conducted within the Kivalliq region, near the communities of Arviat and Baker Lake. The objective of the proposed project was to monitor several species of shorebirds that breed in the Arctic to obtain better estimates for their population size. The project was to be conducted in the summer season and was planned as a long-term, multi-year project designed to help fully understand the trend in arctic shorebird population sizes and the cause of a historic decrease in arctic shorebirds.

The specific locations of the project as assessed in previous years and the proposed activities/components are presented in Table 1:

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Current Amendment

The CWS (Jennie Rausch) is proposing an amendment to the project in order to continue with research on the trend of declining populations of arctic shorebirds and to determine the cause of this decline. The Proponent intends to have surveyed nearly all of the communities and protected areas in Nunavut by the expected project completion date in the year 2020. The proposed project consists of the following:

- New application for a CWS Bird Sanctuary Permit - three (3) year period of authorization (May 15 – August 31 each year);
- New application for a CWS National Wildlife Area Permit - three (3) year period of authorization (May 15 – August 31 each year);
- Aerial and ground surveys throughout the following locations and/or surrounding areas:
 - Communities:
 - Arviat;
 - Baker Lake;
 - Bathurst Inlet;
 - Chesterfield Inlet;
 - Clyde River;
 - Grise Fiord;
 - Hall Beach;
 - Igloolik;
 - Iqaluit;
 - Kugaaruk;
 - Kugluktuk;
 - Pangnirtung;
 - Pond Inlet;
 - Qikiqtarjuaq;
 - Repulse Bay; and
 - Resolute Bay.
 - National Wildlife Areas:
 - Akpait National Wildlife Area;
 - Ningiinganiq National Wildlife Area;
 - Nirjutiqqavvik National Wildlife Area;
 - Polar Bear Pass National Wildlife Area; and
 - Qaqulluit National Wildlife Area.
 - Migratory Bird Sanctuaries:
 - Bylot Island Migratory Bird Sanctuary;
 - Dewey Soper Migratory Bird Sanctuary;
 - East Bay Migratory Bird Sanctuary;
 - Harry Gibbons Migratory Bird Sanctuary;

- McConnell River Migratory Bird Sanctuary;
- Prince Leopold Island Migratory Bird Sanctuary;
- Queen Maud Gulf Migratory Bird Sanctuary; and
- Seymour Island Migratory Bird Sanctuary.
- National Parks:
 - Auyittuq National Park;
 - Sirmilik National Park; and
 - Ukkusiksaliq National Park.
- Wildlife Sanctuary:
 - Thelon Wildlife Sanctuary.
- Temporary camp will consist of:
 - Two (2) large tents (10'x12') for kitchen and storage;
 - One (1) personal sleeping tent for each person in camp (10 in total);
 - Power sources will be propane for cooking and small solar panels to re-charge scientific equipment.
- Transport of personnel and equipment by Twin Otter and helicopter;
- Temporary fuel caching to utilize portable berms; and
- Removal of all combustible and non-combustible wastes.

The NIRB has determined that this request may result in a change to the original scope of the project.

Please note that Section 12.4.3 of the NLCA states that:

“Any application for a component or activity of a project proposal that has been permitted to proceed in accordance with these provisions shall be exempt from the requirement for screening by NIRB unless:

- (a) such component or activity was not part of the original project proposal; or*
- (b) its inclusion would significantly modify the project.”*

The NIRB is of the opinion that the request for the amendment is not likely to *significantly* change the general scope of the original project activities. Therefore the NIRB is *proposing* to re-issue the same terms and conditions as those in the enclosed Screening Decision Reports dated June 7, 2005 and April 2, 2008, along with any new terms and conditions the NIRB considers appropriate. The NIRB is copying parties and municipalities potentially affected by this project and we invite interested persons to comment directly to the NIRB by **June 12, 2013**.

The NIRB would like Parties to provide comments regarding:

- Whether the inclusion of the additionally proposed component(s) and/or activity(ies) would significantly modify the project;
- Any additional mitigation measures that are appropriate; and
- Any other matter of importance to the Party related to the project proposal.
