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Executive Summary

The Nunavut Impact Review Board (NIRB or Board) has prepared and issued this Pre-Hearing Conference Decision Report to provide a summary of the discussions and outcomes resulting from the Technical Meeting, Community Roundtable and Pre-Hearing Conference held in Rankin Inlet on November 23 to 25, 2022. These proceedings were held as part of the NIRB's reconsideration of the terms and conditions of the Meliadine Gold Mine Project Certificate No. 006 for Agnico Eagle Mines Limited's "Meliadine Extension" Project Proposal NIRB File No. 11MN034 (Extension Proposal).

As set out in more detail in the report that follows, the Board has decided that it is premature to schedule the Public Hearing for this file. The Board and parties require additional information necessary to conduct a thorough and complete assessment of the potential for ecosystemic and socio-economic impacts for all components of the Extension Proposal.

The Board's decision considered whether the scheduling of a Public Hearing was reasonable, given the resolution of technical issues and advancement of understanding of the Proposal and its potential impacts on the ecosystemic and socio-economic environments amongst interested parties and potentially affected communities. The Board considered the following to decide whether it was reasonable to schedule an in-person Public Hearing:

- The information requests and technical review comments provided by parties, and follow up discussion at the Technical Meeting;
- The questions, comments, and closing statements provided by community members and the public during the Community Roundtable;
- The feedback of parties during the Pre-Hearing Conference;
- The updates, responses, and commitments provided by the Proponent; and
- The written comments provided by parties on the Proponent's December 1. 2022 Commitments List and outstanding issues.

The Board has concluded that, although the Proponent and parties have been working together to address outstanding issues, there are significant outstanding information requests and technical review comments that parties have indicated are necessary to be addressed before they can complete their technical review of the Extension Proposal in respect of the following items:

- Impacts to caribou;
- Water management;
- In-pit tailings and waste rock disposal;
- Waterlines alignment, crossings, and coverings;
- The windfarm; and
- The airstrip.

The Board and parties require sufficient information to assess the potential for ecosystemic and socio-economic impacts associated with the Extension Proposal in order to proceed to the next

stages of the process. Therefore, the Board encourages the Proponent and parties to continue to work together to resolve these outstanding concerns to the satisfaction of all parties, and to update the NIRB on an on-going basis regarding the status of resolved and unresolved issues as the assessment progresses.

As the assessment process continues, the Board will provide additional details, including updated process and timelines for the next steps. All parties are advised that the Board's proposed next steps are subject to change at the Board's discretion to reflect changes to circumstances, such as revisions to the timing of submission of the outstanding information by Agnico Eagle, determinations by the Board regarding the adequacy of the information received, logistical challenges, previously scheduled commitments on the Board's calendar, *etc*. The Board's proposed next steps include:

- Community information sessions to be conducted in Tadoule Lake and Lac Brochet, Manitoba;
- Agnico Eagle to file all supplemental information the Proponent has committed to provide to parties, with the Board by January 31, 2023;
- Parties and interested members of the public to provide their comments in respect of the supplemental information provided by February 28, 2023; and
- In the week of **March 13-17, 2023**, the Board will host a half-day Pre-Hearing Conference (conducted via teleconference).

In closing, the Board would like to thank all the Technical Meeting, Community Roundtable and Pre-Hearing Conference participants for their participation, cooperation, and efforts to work together as the Board conducts its proceedings. The Board is grateful for the contributions of all participants to the successful completion of these important steps in the Board's process.

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Sommaire

La Commission du Nunavut chargée de l'examen des répercussions (la CNER ou la Commission) a produit et publié son Rapport décisionnel de la conférence préparatoire à l'audience, résumant les discussions et les résultats de la réunion technique, de la table ronde communautaire et de la conférence pré-audience qui ont eu lieu du 23 au 25 novembre 2022 à Rankin Inlet. Ces délibérations s'inscrivaient dans le réexamen par la CNER des modalités et conditions du certificat no.006 du projet de mine d'or Meliadine et ce, aux fins de la proposition de Mines Agnico Eagle Limité « d'Expansion de la Meliadine », no. de référence 11MN034 de la CNER (La proposition d'Expansion ou la proposition).

Tel qu'amplement détaillé dans le rapport ci-après, la Commission a jugé prématuré de programmer une audience publique pour ce dossier. La Commission et les parties réclament des renseignements supplémentaires afin d'entreprendre une rigoureuse et complète évaluation des potentielles répercussions écosystémiques et socio-économiques de toutes les composantes de la proposition d'expansion de la mine.

Pour en arriver à sa décision, la Commission a examiné la rationalité de la tenue d'une audience publique en tenant compte du règlement des questions techniques et de l'avancement de la compréhension de la proposition et de ses potentielles incidences écosystémiques et socio-économiques, chez les parties intéressées et les collectivités touchées. La Commission a analysé les éléments suivants afin de déterminer s'il était ou non raisonnable de programmer une audience publique en présentiel:

- Les demandes d'information et les commentaires de l'examen technique formulés par les parties et la discussion qui a suivi lors de la réunion technique;
- Les questions, commentaires et conclusions des membres de la collectivité et du public au cours de la table ronde communautaire;
- La rétroaction des parties pendant la conférence pré-audience;
- Les mises à jour, les réponses et les engagements du promoteur; et
- Les commentaires écrits des parties prenantes vis-à-vis de la liste d'engagements du promoteur et des questions en suspens au 1^{er} décembre 2022.

Même si le promoteur et les parties se sont conjointement attaqués au règlement des questions en suspens, les parties ont indiqué qu'un nombre important de demandes latentes et de commentaires issus de l'examen technique devaient être traités avant qu'elles puissant terminer leur révision technique de la proposition en ce qui concerne les points suivants:

- Répercussions sur les caribous;
- Gestion de l'eau:
- Évacuation des stériles et des résidus miniers:
- Alignement des conduites d'eau, traverses et revêtements;
- Le champ éolien; et
- La bande d'atterrissage.

La Commission et les parties réclament des renseignements en nombre suffisant pour pouvoir évaluer les potentielles répercussions écosystémiques et socio-économiques de la proposition d'expansion et entamer les étapes suivantes de la procédure. Dans l'attente, la Commission encourage le promoteur et les parties à régler conjointement les questions en suspens, à la satisfaction de toutes les parties concernées et d'aviser régulièrement la CNER de la résolution ou non des questions toujours en suspens au fur et à mesure de l'évolution de l'évaluation.

Au fur et à mesure du déroulement du processus, la Commission fournira des détails supplémentaires, incluant des mises à jour et le calendrier des étapes suivantes. Elle tient à aviser toutes les parties qu'elle peut, à son gré, modifier les prochaines étapes pour s'adapter aux imprévus, comme la révision de la date de présentation par Mines Agnico Eagle des renseignements latents, la détermination par la Commission de la pertinence des informations reçues, des problèmes logistiques, des engagements de la Commission préalablement programmés, etc. La Commission a proposé les étapes suivantes, notamment:

- Organiser des séances d'information communautaire à Tadoule Lake et à Lac Brochet au Manitoba;
- Mines Agnico Eagle dépose auprès de la Commission, avant le 31 janvier 2023, tous les renseignements que le promoteur s'est engagé à fournir aux parties prenantes;
- Les parties prenantes et les membres intéressés de la population soumettent, avant le 28 février 2023, leurs commentaires sur les renseignements supplémentaires fournis; et
- Au cours de la semaine du 13 au 17 mars 2023, la Commission organisera une conférence pré-audience d'une demi-journée (via téléconférence) afin de revoir les questions techniques et de discuter des étapes suivantes.

En terminant, la Commission aimerait remercier tous les participants de la réunion technique, de la table ronde communautaire et de la conférence préparatoire à l'audience de leur présence, leur coopération et leur volonté de travailler conjointement pendant les procédures de la Commission. La CNER tient à les remercier de leurs contributions qui lui ont permis de terminer avec succès ces importantes étapes du processus.

1. Introduction

The objective of the Pre-Hearing Conference Decision Report is to provide further direction and guidance regarding the next stage in the Board's assessment of Agnico Eagle Mines Limited's (Agnico Eagle) "Meliadine Extension" Project Proposal (Extension Proposal or Proposal). The Report provides the next steps and a proposed timeline to complete the technical review stage of the Proposal leading into an eventual Public Hearing.

This Report provides a brief overview of the proceedings and issues discussed by parties and community members during the Technical Meeting, Community Roundtable and Pre-Hearing Conference components of the Board's assessment of the Extension Proposal and provides the Board's direction on the remaining steps in the assessment. These meetings and the Report are in accordance with the mandate and objectives of the Nunavut Impact Review Board (NIRB or Board) established under Article 12 of the Agreement between the Inuit of the Nunavut Settlement Area and Her Majesty the Queen in right of Canada (Nunavut Agreement) and Part 3 of the Nunavut Planning and Project Assessment Act (NuPPAA).

2. The Project Proposal and Procedure

2.1. The Project Proposal Description and Scope

The scope of activities described within the Meliadine Extension Proposal includes the following undertakings, works or activities:

Infrastructure at Meliadine Mine Site

- Addition of underground mining at the Pump, F Zone, and Discovery deposits, which were previously approved for open-pit mining
- Development of a new portal and associated infrastructure, including two (2) access roads to the Tiriganiaq-Wolf deposit
- Construction and operation of a windfarm with eleven (11) wind turbines, associated infrastructure, and an access road
- Option to construct and operate an airstrip and associated infrastructure
- Use of additional borrow pits and quarries to replace depleted sources and build a road to the windfarm, Tiriganiaq-Wolf portal, airstrip, and road to Discovery and other deposits
- Extension of the operation phase (i.e. mine life) by 11 years to 2043
- Increase in employment to 905 employees
- Addition of three (3) wings at the camp to accommodate increased personnel
- Ongoing use of existing infrastructure at the Meliadine Mine Site as previously approved: power plant, mill, camp, helipad, maintenance shop, laydown areas, Meliadine tank farm, emulsion plant, quarries and borrow pits, AWAR, Bypass Road, Discovery Spur Road, access roads, and mining at approved deposits

Infrastructure at Itivia Harbour

 Ongoing use of existing infrastructure as previously approved, including laydown areas, and tank farm

Ore Management

 Additional temporary ore stockpiles adjacent to Pump, F Zone, Tiriganiaq-Wolf, and Discovery




Figure 1: Meliadine Extension – Mine Site




Figure 2: Meliadine Extension - Discovery Site

Water Management Infrastructure

- Continued use of the previously approved waterlines, marine pipeline, and diffuser for discharge of saline effluent (salty groundwater) and surface contact water to Melvin Bay
- Construction and operation of a waterline running from the Discovery deposit to the mine site along the Discovery spur road and AWAR for treatment of saline effluent before discharge to Melvin Bay through the existing waterlines
- Addition of saline ponds at F Zone, Tiriganiaq-Wolf, Pump, and Discovery to collect water originating from underground mine activities
- Water management structures (i.e. dykes, berms, etc.) to be built as needed
- Ongoing use of existing freshwater sources, water intake, and potable water treatment system
- Continued use of water management infrastructure (e.g., saline and contact water collection ponds, channels, dikes, berms, jetties, pump systems and pipelines, and culverts), and contact and saline treatment systems
- Increase in capacity of sewage treatment plant
- Option for storage of saline effluent in exhausted pits




Figure 3: Meliadine Extension Footprint




Figure 4: Alternative - Exhausted Pits for Tailings Storage




Figure 5: Alternative - Exhausted Pits for Waste Rock Storage

Waste Management

- Expansion of existing waste rock storage facilities (WRSF), addition of new WRSFs, and continued use of existing WRSFs
- Addition of temporary salt waste rock piles for underground waste rock;
- Option for waste rock storage in open pits
- Use of the dry stack Tailings Storage Facility within the existing approved footprint
- Option for in-pit slurry tailings deposition in exhausted pits
- Additional landfill to be built within the Discovery WRSF
- Addition of landfarms at the Wesmeg and Discovery deposits
- Inclusion of a composter and second incinerator
- Ongoing use of existing landfills, landfarms, and incinerator

Fuel and hazardous material

- Installation of fuel storage tanks and containment facilities at Pump, F Zone, Tiriganiaq-Wolf, and Discovery. Each site will consist of one (1) 50,000 litres (L) tank and four (4) 75,000 L tanks for a total of 350,000 L per site;
- Addition of a 6,000,000 L fuel storage tank and secondary containment at the existing main site;
- Option to install two (2) 50,000 L aviation fuel storage tanks adjacent to the potential airstrip;
- Ongoing use of approved hazardous waste material;

2.2. Procedural History

<u>Table 1</u> highlights key procedural steps associated with the Board's assessment of the Extension Proposal and associated reconsideration of the terms and conditions of the Meliadine Gold Mine Project Certificate No. 006, up to and including the receipt of comments from parties on the Agnico Eagle's December 1, 2022 version of the Commitments List. As this summary is not exhaustive, parties wishing to develop a more complete understanding of the activities associated with the NIRB's assessment of the Proposal are encouraged to consult the complete listing of all documentation available from the NIRB's online Public Registry. 3. Participant Funding

On August 22, 2022, Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC) awarded funding to the following Northern Participant Funding Program applicants to assist with their participation in the NIRB's assessment of the Proposal:

Although the assessment has not yet reached the stage of participants requesting Intervenor status prior to the Public Hearing, the NIRB's practice has been to accept that organizations receiving participant funding would be recognized as Intervenors in the NIRB's assessment of the Proposal. Intervenors in the NIRB's Public Hearings are allowed to question the Proponent, Authorizing Agencies, Designated Inuit Organizations, and other interested parties, and have set time on the Agenda to present their positions on the Proposal and discuss issues and concerns.

4. Conduct of Proceedings

4.1. Technical Meeting

Due to weather issues that caused travel disruptions, the start of the Technical Meeting (TM) was delayed by one day and was held on November 23-24, 2022. The Technical Meeting was an opportunity to bring technical reviewers together with the Proponent and Board's staff to address technical issues associated with the FEIS Addendum. A goal of the Technical Meeting was to achieve further clarity and/or resolution on topics where reviewers had questions, or did not support the methodology, analyses or conclusions contained in the FEIS Addendum.

Commitments List

In advance of the Technical Meeting, the Proponent made 18 commitments intended to address the information requests and technical review comments. As the Proponent and parties continued discussions on technical issues and commitments throughout the Technical Meeting, the Board requested that Agnico Eagle submit an updated list of commitments on December 1, 2022. The updated list of commitments contains a total of 47 commitments.² On December 8, 2022, parties submitted comments on whether they agree with Agnico Eagle's updated Commitments List provided on December 1, 2022, and to also indicate whether any technical issues remain unresolved. Based on the feedback from several parties, the Board acknowledges that finalized wording of commitments has yet to be agreed to by all parties and there are several unresolved issues that have been flagged by parties as unaddressed. Thus, the Board encourages the Proponent and parties to continue to work together and keep the Board advised as issues are resolved, and wording of specific commitments is agreed to and finalized.

4.2. Community Roundtable and Pre-Hearing Conference

4.2.1. Community Roundtable

On November 24-25, 2022, the NIRB's Chairperson and staff facilitated the Community Roundtable (CRT) in Rankin Inlet. The Community Roundtable is a key step in the NIRB's process, allowing designated community representatives and members of the public an opportunity to raise comments and questions regarding the Extension Proposal, with the Proponent and parties present. Simultaneous interpretation in Inuktitut was available throughout the meetings, as well as translation of presented materials to ensure accessibility to participants in both languages.

The objectives of the Community Roundtable were:

- To provide information to the delegated community representatives and general public about the Extension Proposal and its relation to the approved Meliadine Gold Mine Project;
- To encourage all community representatives and members of the public in attendance to ask questions about the Proposal, its potential impacts and the Proponent's proposed environmental management, mitigation, and monitoring plans; and
- To provide opportunities to community representatives and members of the public in Rankin Inlet to share their knowledge, comments on the Proposal, and to provide their input to the Board.

The meetings were also advertised to the public of Rankin Inlet. Both community representatives and members of the public were provided time to ask questions about the Proposal to the Proponent and parties, and provide comments and concerns about the Proposal to the Board.

The Proponent and parties, as presented in section <u>4.1</u>, were in attendance and available to answer comments and questions from the community representatives and public. A full summary list of participants can be found in <u>Appendix B</u> of this report.

Community Roundtable Presentation

Agnico Eagle provided a summary presentation for the "Meliadine Extension" Proposal directed to community representatives and the public. The presentation was delivered on the first evening session of the Community Roundtable to accommodate members of the public who work during the day and therefore likely missed presentations and discussions that occurred throughout the Technical Meeting. In total, 14 community representatives participated in person during the Community Roundtable. The oral format of the meetings allowed the community representatives to:

- Hear presentations delivered by Agnico Eagle during the Technical Meeting as set out in the Agenda (section 4.1 and Appendix C)
- Hear a summarized presentation about the Extension Proposal provided during the evening session of the Community Roundtable (section 4.2.1); and
- Participate by sharing their knowledge and views, asking questions of the Proponent, parties and the NIRB, and expressing their comments with respect to the Extension Proposal.

The Community Roundtable concluded with each community providing a summary of their views in respect of the Extension Proposal in a closing statement. The Community Roundtable also allowed an opportunity for members of the public from Rankin Inlet to ask questions and raise concerns. Table 5 summarizes the key comments, questions posed, and issues raised by community representatives and members of the public during the Community Roundtable and Pre-Hearing Conference. The summary table is provided for the convenience of reviewers, but parties are cautioned that the summary is not a verbatim record of comments provided, and has been summarized and organized by the Board staff according to topic.

	We were always told to be observers during the migration and were told never to kill the first caribou that arrive, as they are the leaders of the herd. I don't know how long it was after Meliadine was opened that the caribou started to travel again through the area. In the 90s we used to see thousands of caribou in our area, but we do not see them in those numbers anymore. It is very difficult to hunt caribou now if you don't have access to ATVs; people are no longer observing the tradition of allowing the lead caribou to go through, we need to return to these traditions.
	In the picture when the caribou are climbing the esker and are passing over the slope to cross the road Agnico Eagle may think this is a good sign, but Inuit don't think it is good because the caribou are climbing up the slope and this stresses them. The road should be more level with the ground so that the caribou do not have to climb at all; this could potentially be causing stress, suffering and injury. My father used to say that the animals are not "game"; wildlife is not something that we should be playing with.

6. Summary of the Commitments and Outstanding Issues

As noted previously in the Report, due to time constraints, the NIRB requested that an updated Commitments List be provided after the Pre-Hearing Conference followed by an opportunity for parties to provide their comments and state any outstanding issues. On December 1, 2022, Agnico Eagle submitted an updated draft of the Commitments List with additional commitments developed during or since the proceedings.³

The NIRB received comments on the Commitments List from the KIA, GN, CIRNAC, ECCC, DFO, HC, NRCan, TC, NDFN and SDFN, which are summarized in <u>Table 6</u>.

7. Nunavut Impact Review Board Analysis & Decision

7.1. Jurisdiction of the Board

The NIRB conducted the Pre-Hearing Conference associated with the Board's reconsideration of specific terms and conditions in Agnico Eagle's Meliadine Gold Mine Project Certificate 006, for the "Meliadine Extension" Project Proposal (Extension Proposal or Proposal) under Section 12.8.2 of the *Nunavut Agreement* and s. 112 of the *NuPPAA* in the afternoon of November 25, 2022.

The purpose of the Pre-Hearing Conference was to inform the NIRB's consideration of the next steps in the Board's assessment of the Extension Proposal. The Board's Chairperson chaired the PHC and the Proponent and parties were invited to comment on outstanding issues, process, procedure, timing, and logistics for potential next steps. Due to the one-day delay in the start of the Technical Meeting, resulting from the travel cancellations and inclement weather delays as parties travelled to Rankin Inlet, the Board deferred the discussion of the list of commitments that would typically take place at the end of the Technical Meeting to a written process in the weeks following the close of the meetings. On December 1, 2022, Agnico Eagle filed an updated Commitments List associated with the Extension Proposal that was current to December 1, 2022⁴

and reflected commitments made during the NIRB meetings in Rankin Inlet. Subsequently, parties filed their views on the December 1, 2022 version of the Commitments List by December 8, 2022 (see <u>Table 6</u>).

In preparing the Board's updated procedural guidance to govern next steps in the NIRB's reconsideration, the Board considered:

- The written materials provided by Agnico Eagle to date, including the Extension Proposal application materials, Final Environmental Impact Statement Addendum (FEIS Addendum), responses to comments and information requests, supplementary written submissions and list of commitments to parties to address outstanding information requests and technical issues;
- The written materials submitted by parties to date, including information requests, technical review comments, and comments in respect of supplementary information, responses and commitments provided by Agnico Eagle; and
- The presentations of the Proponent, the comments and questions of parties, community representatives and the public provided during the Technical Meeting, Community Roundtable and Pre-Hearing Conference (November 23-25, 2022).

7.2. Procedural Issues

Taking into account the information listed above, the Board's decision on the next steps in the Board's assessment of the Extension Proposal is as follows.

1. Identification of any issues preventing the convening of a Public Hearing

Nunavut Tunngavik Incorporated (NTI) indicated that although NTI had not identified any issues preventing the file from advancing to a Public Hearing, they supported the submissions of the Kivalliq Inuit Association (KIA) with respect to the KIA's position that scheduling the Public Hearing was premature. The KIA then stated that as of the date of the Pre-Hearing Conference (November 25, 2022) all of the KIA's technical review comments remained outstanding. Further, the KIA indicated that to date Agnico Eagle had not supplied sufficient information to conduct a complete assessment of the potential for the Extension Proposal to have adverse impacts on:

- wildlife (especially caribou); and
- water quality in Meliadine Lake.

The KIA noted that the Minister identified these two issues as central to the Board's reconsideration process. Having concluded that Agnico Eagle had not provided the relevant information necessary for the Board and parties to conduct a thorough and complete assessment of all activities within the scope of the Extension Proposal, the KIA considered it premature for the Board to schedule the Public Hearing. The KIA commented that the Board's assessment is not something that should be rushed and that taking additional time to ensure all parties have received the information necessary to complete their assessment is consistent with the precautionary principle. The KIA requested that once Agnico Eagle has provided all relevant information identified by the parties as necessary to complete the assessment, the NIRB should convene

another Pre-Hearing Conference, at which time Public Hearing timelines and logistics could be discussed.

The Government of Nunavut supported the view expressed by the KIA that outstanding information requirements and unresolved technical issues are such that the file should not proceed to a Public Hearing at this time.

The Kangiqliniq Hunters and Trappers Organization (KHTO) indicated that Agnico Eagle has provided insufficient information about the potential impacts of windfarms on caribou in the materials filed to date, and this remains an outstanding issue for the KHTO.

Sayisi Dene First Nation (SDFN) and Northlands Denesuline First Nation (NDFN) identified that each of their technical comments remain unresolved. Consequently, SDFN and NDFN fully supported the KIA's position that the file should not proceed to a Public Hearing and also KIA's request that a further Pre-Hearing Conference be scheduled once the required information has been provided.

Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC), on behalf of the Government of Canada (GoC), noted that Agnico Eagle had provided commitments to several GoC parties to provide additional information, but details were not yet confirmed regarding when information would be provided, the form of the additional information and the amount of time required for the GoC to review and comment on the information. Reflecting these uncertainties, CIRNAC indicated that it was difficult for the GoC to provide recommendations regarding a timeline for the Public Hearing during the PHC.

Agnico Eagle responded that the Proponent had made several commitments during the meetings to provide various parties with additional information in December and January. On that basis, Agnico Eagle proposed that the NIRB consider setting a date for the Public Hearing in the PHC Decision Report sometime within the month of March 2023.

a. Community consultation request from the SDFN and NDFN

During the discussion of issues that may prevent the assessment of the Extension Proposal from proceeding to a Public Hearing, legal counsel for the Manitoba SDFN and NDFN stated that additional community engagement is necessary to allow both communities to fully participate in the NIRB's assessment of the Extension Proposal. SDFN and NDFN indicated that their expectations for community consultation have not been met because their home communities have not been treated the same as the potentially affected Kivalliq communities (e.g. SDFN and NDFN have not had community information sessions about the Extension Proposal conducted by NIRB in their home communities, and were limited to the NIRB providing support for a single community representative from each of the SDFN and NDFN to attend the TM/CRT/PHC rather than the three (3) community representatives supported for each Kivalliq community). The SDFN and NDFN indicated that the lack of community engagement to date "undermines the Crown's ability to rely on the NIRB process to discharge the Crown's duty to consult" under s. 35 of the Canadian *Constitution Act, 1982*. To address this situation, the SDFN and NDFN indicated that the NIRB should conduct Community Information Sessions in their home communities of Tadoule

Lake and Lac Brochet, Manitoba respectively, to provide information about the Extension Proposal at least 30 days before the final written submissions of the parties and the public are required to be filed before a Public Hearing. The SDFN and NDFN also indicated that the NIRB should ensure that the SDFN and NDFN are able to send the same number of community representatives to the Public Hearing as the NIRB allows the potentially affected Kivalliq communities to send.

As the Board acknowledges that the jurisdiction to determine the scope and content of indigenous rights asserted under s. 35 of *the Constitution Act, 1982*, to determine the adequacy of consultation, and to make determinations regarding the required accommodation of such rights remains with the Government of Canada, the Chairperson asked CIRNAC to provide the Board with direction regarding the SDFN's and NDFN's request. CIRNAC acknowledged the requests of SDFN and NDFN, and indicated that the GoC considered these requests to be reasonable and consistent with the responsible Ministers' prior acknowledgement of the asserted and established s. 35 rights of the SDFN and NDFN in Nunavut, as stated in the Responsible Ministers' January 31, 2022 decision for Agnico Eagle's Saline Effluent Discharge to the Marine Environment Project Proposal. The GoC reaffirmed their recognition of the asserted and established s. 35 rights of the SDFN and NDFN in Nunavut in the context of the Board's current reconsideration of the Expansion Proposal and acknowledged the Board's discretion to determine how best to accommodate these rights.

2- Discussion and Facilitation of the Public Hearing Process

a. Anticipated date, time, form, and location(s) to schedule the Public Hearing

As noted above, Agnico Eagle was the lone participant during the PHC to express the view that the assessment should proceed to a Public Hearing, and identified the month of March 2023 as an appropriate time for the Public Hearing. All other participants indicated that it is not yet possible to set a date for the Public Hearing.

With respect to the form and location of a future Public Hearing, all parties indicated unanimous support for the Public Hearing to be conducted in person in the community of Rankin Inlet.

b. Timetable for the exchange of documents and information requests prior to the Public Hearing

Upon review of the December 1, 2022 version of the Commitments List provided by Agnico Eagle⁵, it appears to the Board that as of January 31, 2023, Agnico Eagle intends to provide all of the additional information the Proponent considers necessary to be provided in advance of the Public Hearing.

During the PHC and further specified in their responses to the December 1, 2022 version of the Commitments List, parties indicated that once Agnico Eagle has provided additional relevant information, they would require sufficient time to review these additional submissions and provide their technical comments on the information to the Board. Specifically, in responding to the

Commitments List, the SDFN and NDFN anticipated that they would require until March 31, 2023 for commitment 25, regarding a windfarm site visit with the TAG.

c. Confirmation of Commitments List by parties

As noted above, due to timing constraints arising from the one-day delay in starting the Technical Meeting, the discussion of the Commitments List was deferred to a written process to take place after the TM/CRT/PHC.

The December 1, 2022 version of the Commitments List provided by Agnico Eagle⁵ lists 47 commitments made by Agnico Eagle to resolve the technical issues identified by parties during their initial technical review of the Extension Proposal.

As summarized in <u>Table 6</u>, the following parties provided comments in respect of the December 1, 2022 version of the Commitments List by December 8, 2022:

- Kivalliq Inuit Association
- Government of Nunavut
- Government of Canada:
 - o Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada
 - o Environment and Climate Change Canada
 - o Fisheries and Oceans Canada
 - Health Canada
 - Natural Resources Canada
 - Transport Canada
- Northlands Denesuline First Nation and Sayisi Dene First Nation

d. Finalization of issues for the Public Hearing, and identification of interested parties to attend the Public Hearing

As several parties identified that they did not have sufficient information to complete an assessment of the potential for various components of the Extension Proposal (e.g. the proposed airstrip, windfarm, and in-pit tailings and waste rock disposal) to have adverse effects on wildlife (particularly caribou and fish) and water quality in Meliadine Lake, discussions to finalize the list of issues for the Public Hearing were deferred.

With respect to the inclusion of various alternatives within the scope of the Extension Proposal, the Board clarified that Agnico Eagle must provide sufficient details about the proposed alternatives to enable parties to assess the potential for impacts associated with the alternatives. If sufficient information for the Board and parties to conduct an assessment of a given alternative is not provided during the reconsideration, the Board may exclude that alternative from the scope of the project proposal as assessed. The Board indicated that the mention of an alternative in the project proposal, with an indication that the details surrounding the alternative and assessment of potential for impacts would be deferred to a future regulatory process such as the licensing or permitting stage, is insufficient to constitute an alternative that was adequately assessed during the Board's reconsideration process.

With respect to the identification of interested parties to attend the Public Hearing, all parties and community representatives present at the Pre-Hearing Conference identified their interest or community's interest in participating in the Public Hearing. In addition, the Government of Nunavut indicated that the NIRB should consider extending an invitation the Beverly and Qamanirjuaq Caribou Management Board to attend the Public Hearing.

e. Logistic arrangement, equipment, language, interpretation, translation, and transcript requirements

All parties agreed that they did not anticipate requiring changes to the Board's current Rules of Procedure (September 2009) for the conduct of an in-person Public Hearing.

f. Other matters that may aid in the simplification of the Public Hearing

Parties generally deferred to the NIRB with no additional recommendations regarding how the Board, the Proponent or the parties could simplify the Public Hearing. However, Agnico Eagle indicated that it would be beneficial for the Public Hearing to include time for a site visit to the existing Meliadine Mine site and infrastructure.

8. Conclusions of the Board

Based on the submissions of the parties received by the Board in writing, during the Technical Meeting, Community Roundtable and Pre-Hearing Conference (November 23-25), and the responses to the December 1, 2022 version of the draft Commitments List provided by Agnico Eagle, and for the reasons set out in this section, the Board has decided that it is premature to schedule the Public Hearing for this file. At this time, recognizing that the Board and parties are awaiting important information necessary to conduct a thorough and complete assessment of the potential for ecosystemic and socio-economic impacts for all components, including alternatives, currently included within the scope of the Extension Proposal, the Board has proposed that the next steps in the Board's assessment include:

- The NIRB hosting community information sessions in Tadoule Lake and Lac Brochet, Manitoba;
- Agnico Eagle providing supplemental information;
- Parties and the Board reviewing and commenting on the supplemental information received; and
- The Board hosting a second Pre-Hearing Conference for the file.

In Section 8.3 the Board has provided a proposed process and tentative timelines for these next steps.

The Board recognizes that Agnico Eagle has maintained that much of the information requested by parties should be deferred to discussions during the Nunavut Water Board (NWB) licence amendment process. The NIRB reminds all parties that the integrated regulatory process requires that the assessment of impacts take place during the NIRB process, as a precursor to, and to inform the subsequent licensing and permitting processes of regulators such as the NWB, Fisheries and

Oceans Canada, Transport Canada and permitting of landowners. The licensing and permitting process is not a substitute for project assessment. While the NIRB recognizes that the level of technical detail is more extensive and refined during the licensing and permitting stage compared to the assessment stage, for all components of a proposal to be considered to be assessed by the NIRB, information sufficient to assess the potential for ecosystemic and socio-economic effects must be provided to the NIRB during a reconsideration. If the information provided for the individual components within the scope of a proposal is considered by the Board to be inadequate to conduct a thorough assessment, the Board may exclude those components that cannot be adequately assessed from the scope of the proposal.

8.1. Community Consultation Request of SDFN and NDFN

As referenced above, in advance of and during the Pre-Hearing Conference, legal counsel from the SDFN and NDFN indicated to the NIRB that these parties expected to be involved in the Board's assessment of the Extension Proposal based on their asserted rights in Nunavut under s. 35 of the Constitution Act, 1982. Consequently, the SDFN and NDFN indicated that they expected their home communities to be treated the same as the seven (7) potentially affected Inuit communities within the Kivalliq. The basis for, and level of participation differed from the Board's prior approach to the involvement of the SDFN and NDFN in the Board's previous reconsideration of the Meliadine Gold Mine Project under the Saline Effluent Discharge to the Marine Environment Project Proposal (Waterlines Proposal) completed in 2021. The Board's approach in the Waterlines Proposal reconsideration was consistent with the direction of the Minister from previous assessments where the basis for the participation in the NIRB's assessment process for Indigenous Groups living outside Nunavut was on the potential for impacts on caribou to result in transboundary impacts on Indigenous Groups outside of Nunavut. Reflecting this approach, during the Board's assessment of the Waterlines Proposal, the Board focused on the potential for transboundary impacts on caribou to affect the SDFN and NDFN as Indigenous Groups dependent on the resource. From a practical standpoint, this meant that during the assessment of the Waterlines Proposal, the SDFN and NDFN participated as Intervenors speaking to potential transboundary effects in the Board's proceedings, and a single community representative from each community participated during the Board's Community Roundtable sessions during the Pre-Hearing Conference and the Public Hearing.

The response of the Minister of Northern Affairs to the Board's Notice of Reconsideration for the Extension Proposal (issued on June 22, 2022) did not indicate that the Board's previous approach to the participation of the SDFN and NDFN in the Waterlines Proposal reconsideration should be revisited. Accordingly, the Board planned for the same level and status of participation of the SDFN and NDFN as in the Waterlines Proposal reconsideration. As the NIRB does not have the jurisdiction to assess the scope and content of s. 35 indigenous rights as asserted by the SDFN and NDFN within Nunavut, the Board sought direction from the Minister to clarify the expectations of the Crown in terms of the SDFN's and NDFN's participation, as it was not limited to the potential for transboundary impacts, but more broadly on their asserted indigenous rights within the Nunavut Settlement Area.

As indicated in section 7.2, during the Pre-Hearing Conference, Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada provided clarification to the Board in respect of the SDFN's and NDFN's participation in the assessment of the Extension Proposal. It was clarified that CIRNAC considered the request of SDFN and NDFN, to be treated the same as the potentially affected Kivalliq communities, to be reasonable and consistent with the responsible Ministers' acknowledgement of the asserted and established s. 35 rights of the SDFN and NDFN in Nunavut. Based on this clarification from CIRNAC, the Board will be confirming the funding and logistical arrangements for the Board to conduct a community information session about the Extension Proposal in each of Tadoule Lake and Lac Brochet, Manitoba. The Board has directed that these community information sessions be completed at least 30 days before the deadline for Intervenors and interested parties to file final written submissions with the Board in advance of the Public Hearing for the file. In addition, the NIRB will also confirm funding and logistics to support the in-person attendance of up to five (5) community representatives during the Community Roundtable session of the Public Hearing.

8.2. Outstanding Issues

As indicated during the Technical Meeting and subsequently reiterated in parties' comments on Agnico Eagle's December 1, 2022 draft of the Commitments List, several parties (e.g. Kivalliq Inuit Association, Government of Nunavut, Kangiqliniq Hunters and Trappers Organization, Northlands Denesuline First Nation and Sayisi Dene First Nation) indicated that it is unacceptable to defer the outstanding technical issues regarding the potential for the Extension Proposal to impact terrestrial wildlife (caribou in particular) to the Terrestrial Advisory Group for the Meliadine Gold Mine Project. These parties note that the TAG has yet to become established and functional, the TAG membership does not include all parties interested and/or with a mandate for caribou management, and it remains unclear whether the TAG will be operational in time to provide advice and direction to the NIRB in respect of the assessment of the Extension Proposal. The Board shares this concern, and in the Board's December 9, 2022 correspondence⁶ asked Agnico Eagle to provide a clear indication regarding the information with respect to the assessment of potential effects on caribou that would be provided during the Board's assessment.

The Board also notes that there are outstanding information requests and technical review comments that parties have indicated are necessary to be addressed before they can complete their technical review of the Extension Proposal in respect of the following items:

- In-pit tailings and waste rock disposal;
- Waterlines alignment, crossings and coverings;
- The windfarm; and
- The airstrip.

As stated by the Board above, to be included within the scope of the assessment, the Board requires information sufficient to assess the potential for ecosystemic and socio-economic impacts associated with these components.

8.3. Proposed Process and Timelines for the Next Steps in the Board's Reconsideration

As noted above, the Board agrees with the submission of the Kivalliq Inuit Association and supported by the other parties, that following the submission and review by parties and the Board of Agnico Eagle's supplemental information, it would be useful for the Board to conduct a second Pre-Hearing Conference to focus on the identification of resolved and outstanding technical issues, and the potential timing and logistics for a Public Hearing. The Board has structured the proposed process and timelines that follow to reflect the Board hosting a second Pre-Hearing Conference via teleconference. All parties are advised that these next steps and associated timelines are subject to change at the Board's discretion to reflect changes to circumstances, such as revisions to the timing of submission of the outstanding information by Agnico Eagle, determinations by the Board regarding the adequacy of the information received, logistical challenges, previously scheduled commitments on the Board's calendar, etc.:

- In January, 2023, the NIRB will work with CIRNAC and Northlands Denesuline First Nation and Sayisi Dene First Nation to confirm funding and logistics for community information sessions to be conducted in Tadoule Lake and Lac Brochet, Manitoba on dates to be confirmed with the communities in January or early February, 2023;
- On or before 2:00 pm MST, on Tuesday, January 31, 2023 Agnico Eagle files with the Board all supplemental information the Proponent has committed to provide to parties before the Public Hearing, confirmation of the scope of the Extension Proposal (including confirmation of preferred alternatives that should be included in the scope) and (if applicable) files an updated Commitments List to reflect the resolution of outstanding technical issues since the filing of Agnico Eagle's December 1, 2022 draft;
- On or before 2:00 pm MST on Tuesday, February 28, 2023 parties and interested members of the public provide their comments in respect of the supplemental information provided by Agnico Eagle, and (if applicable) an updated Commitments List; and
- In the week of **March 13-17, 2023**, the Board will host a half-day Pre-Hearing Conference (conducted via teleconference) to discuss next steps in the assessment, including the potential timing and logistics of a Public Hearing.

The Board thanks all participants of the recent Technical Meeting, Community Roundtable and Pre-Hearing Conference for their contributions to conducting productive meetings under challenging circumstances. The Board recognizes that participants may have very strong feelings, including disagreement with other participants, but as the Board has generally come to expect, strong emotions and differing perspectives can be conveyed in a manner that is respectful and

productive. The Board appreciated the efforts of all parties to respect the perspectives of other and to observe the process and procedural directions of the Board.
