Subject: Monitoring and Intervention

Request:

- 1. It is requested that the Proponent specify at what stage and by what process it will develop a comprehensive and coordinated monitoring program and an initial set of indicators to monitor the effects of the Project and mitigation measures. Without this information at the Review stage, it is very difficult to 'get a handle' on the determination of significance and how affects will or even can be monitored.
- 2. It is requested that, as partners in the Q-SEMC, the Proponent and Committee members comment on the expertise and support that each can provide to ensure that the Committee has the capacity to perform effective monitoring.
- 3. Rapid intervention in regard to adverse socio-economic impacts is critical. It is requested that the Proponent describe what mechanisms it will include in the monitoring plan to ensure that information flows from all monitoring initiatives (Project, Q-SEMC, and perhaps others) in time to trigger and implement corrective actions.
- 4. It is requested that the Proponent comment on the extent and ways that monitoring associated with the IIBA could be coordinated with these other monitoring efforts in order to avoid redundancy in data collection and to obtain a more complete picture of impacts and benefits to Inuit.

GN Response:

2. The Government of Nunavut is responding on behalf of many Q-SEMC members, as the Government of Nunavut funds the Committee and acts as Committee Chair.

Regional Socio-Economic Monitoring Committees (SEMC) have been established in order to respond to both project-specific and regional baseline data collection and socio-economic monitoring requirements for each region. The SEMC's have Terms of Reference approved by the Government of Nunavut and Indian and Northern Affairs Canada.

The Qikiqtani-SEMC has held three meetings to date, in February 2009 (Igloolik), November 2009 (Iqaluit), May 2010 (Pond Inlet). Members of the Committee consistently participate in all meetings, indicating they, indeed, have the capacity to continue to do so. Membership includes representatives from the Government of Nunavut, representatives from Indian and Northern Affairs Canada, representatives from each municipality (usually Mayors and/or Economic Development Officers), project proponents (Baffinland Iron Mines Corporation, Peregrine Diamonds, Advanced Exploration Inc. have all participated in previous meetings), and the Qikiqtani Inuit Organization. In addition, the Committee invites an Elder representative and a youth representative from the host community to participate.

The Q-SEMC is currently at the baseline information-gathering stage. Indicators are being selected and information is being collected. Companies and government representatives continue to offer a wealth of baseline and current socio-economic information. In general, information is provided by proponents on the baseline indicators selected by the Committee

or, if required, by indicators which may arise through the review of the Final Environmental Impact Statement or included in the Project Certificate. Communication with Baffinland Iron Mines Corporation has been ongoing. It is expected that socio-economic information that can be shared by the company will be provided to the Committee on a regular basis pending the results of the Environmental Assessment process.

Information is also collated by government from its various departments and other agencies, who collect information directly. Appropriate information is presented to the Committee to contribute to the identified baseline indicators, and continued data collection and distribution from government departments will support subsequent project-specific indicators.

Community representatives provide information that validates the socio-economic state of communities and report on changes taking place in their communities. In this way, trends which may not be apparent in the statistical information can be identified. This may also result in modifications to indicators or data collection methods.

The Government of Nunavut remains committed to facilitating socio-economic monitoring through coordinating information related to mineral development (Nunavut Mineral Exploration and Mining Strategy, Action 2-9). The SEMCs provide the necessary forum for this information gathering and sharing. As a result, the Government of Nunavut is responsible for bringing members together, facilitating these meetings, and reporting to NIRB. The capacity of the Q-SEMC to maintain its early momentum is enhanced by secured funding by the Department of Economic Development and Transportation, which will support additional technical expertise in data collection, distribution, analysis and reporting.

To: Baffinland and Government of Nunavut **Subject: Assurances of Compliance**

Request:

1. It is requested that the Proponent produce a summary list of the project certificates and attached terms and conditions granted to mines in Nunavut and the Northwest Territories over the last 20 or so years.

- 2. It is requested that the Proponent and the Government of Nunavut elaborate on the anticipated content and process involved in creating a Development Partnership Agreement (DPA), such as the one mentioned in Vol. 4, section, 13.2, p185.
- 3. It is requested that the Proponent state its willingness to cooperate with the QIA to draft a Socio-economic Table of Commitments as a major tool in overall Project mitigation and management. This Table would list specific commitments, such as payments to a community support fund or agreement to implement a training program. The Table would include all responsible authorities, timelines and criteria to meet, and any consequences for non-compliance. All responsible authorities would have to agree and sign off on listed Commitments. The Table would be subject to periodic review and independent audit.
- 4. The Proponent states that its Environmental Health and Safety (EHS) management system is also consistent with ISO 14001:2004 (Environmental) Management System standards. It is requested that the Company comment on its intent to pursue formal ISO 14001 Certification (and the reasons why if it does not intend to pursue Certification).

GN Response:

- 2. The Development Partnership Agreement (DPA) is a voluntary agreement of mutual benefit between a company and the Government of Nunavut to enhance benefits to communities potentially affected by development projects. Strategic economic development priorities for the *Development Partnership Agreement Program* include:
 - physical infrastructure development and investment;
 - human capacity building through education and training;
 - participation in employment opportunities by Nunavummiut;
 - local business development and diversification; and,
 - · community capacity building.

A company must sign a DPA to be eligible for the Fuel Tax Rebate program. A DPA cannot be signed until after a company has been issued a Project Certificate.

In May, 2009, Baffinland Iron Mines Corporation formally indicated to the Government of Nunavut that they were interested in negotiating a DPA.

Subject: Impact Assessment Thresholds

Request:

- 1. It is requested that the Proponent present rationale for the 10% and 20% thresholds.
- 2. It is requested that clarity be provided as to whether it is reasonable to apply the same 10% threshold to assess the broad range of different impacts found in the DEIS.

GN Response:

2. Thresholds play an important role in the determination of the significance of environmental effects during the EA process, and further in potentially triggering a contingency response to an impact, should it occur. The determination of thresholds should be specific to each valued component, but may not be available for all valued components. The review of the appropriateness of each threshold (whether 10%, 20% or another type of threshold) is an important aspect of the technical review stage of the Draft EIS. At this stage of the process the provision of technical comments on the appropriateness of specific threshold values is considered to be premature. After the information requests are received, the appropriateness of each threshold will need to be examined as part of the detailed technical review.

Subject: Use of Full Complement of North Baffin Caribou Collar Data

Request:

- 1. It is requested that the GN provide the Proponent with the most recent complete North Baffin caribou collar dataset for use in the baseline and impact assessment for this project.
- 2. It is requested that the GN clarify if they are aware of any other data in relation to North Baffin caribou that may not be listed in the proponent's baseline reports. If so, it is requested that the GN provide additional data so that it can be integrated into the DEIS.
- 3. It is requested that the Proponent clarify whether addition data will be integrated into the DEIS provide an updated analyses to examine seasonal habitat use, fidelity to seasonal habitat and movements, and calving locations.

GN Response:

The GN would like to thank the QIA for participating in the NIRB process. The GN is a source for data, information, and past research pertaining to caribou in Nunavut. The provision of specific data and information on caribou is undertaken in accordance with a process that occurs directly between the GN and the proponent. Data that is requested by a proponent, and available from the GN for release, is shared in accordance the data sharing agreements.

The analysis and reporting of information obtained from the GN is the responsibility of the proponent. During the detailed technical review of the Draft EIS, the GN will be reviewing the baseline and impact assessments provided by the proponent for its contents and completeness. If deficiencies are noted in the data and/or the analysis of the information provided, the GN will identify these deficiencies in its review comments to NIRB.

Subject: Applicable Acts, Regulations, Guidelines, and, Policies

Request:

- 1. It is requested that the Proponent provide additional information, to define how the act(s)/regulation(s)/policy would apply to each project component (i.e., road, railway, sea route, fuel storage, abandonment and reclamation etc.). Where possible reference to where further context has been provided within DEIS should be provided, including section and page number.
- 2. It is requested that each Responsible Agency provide a summary of the project components that will require their attention according to the mandates authorized unto them by their governing jurisdictions. It is requested that each Responsible Agency provide context into their role in inspection, monitoring, and enforcement activities with respect to their act/regulation.
- 3. It is requested that the Proponent compile the information requested under 1 and 2 into a comprehensive table.

GN Response:

In many instances, the Government of Nunavut's Acts and Regulations apply to various project components, physical activities or other aspects of a project that may take place in Nunavut. Therefore, for the purposes of our review of an Environmental Impact Statement, the Government of Nunavut looks at development projects as a whole rather than each individual project component independently. A Project Certificate will also include a list of approvals and Terms and Conditions that will identify various parties' roles and responsibilities, which the Government of Nunavut will respect and follow. The Government of Nunavut always aims to fully enforce our Acts and Regulations.

The attached table provides an overview of the key Acts, Regulations, and Policies which guide our mandates and define our jurisdictional responsibility. This list is not definitive. Readers should consult the legal or official text of the legislation, regulations and policies for further details. This table is provided for information only.

Request:

1) It is requested that each Responsible Agency with a permit, licence or other approval commit to presenting their role in the project assessment and operational setting for the proposed project. To assist with this commitment, QIA will commit to working with all Responsible Agencies to facilitate effective community interactions.

GN Response:

The Government of Nunavut can confirm that the items listed under Vol. 1, Table 1-15.1 are correct, and our role with the proposed project is to enforce these. Further, as seen in the attached table, the Government of Nunavut has various responsibilities under applicable legislation; the Government of Nunavut will work with NIRB, the project proponent and other stakeholders as necessary to address these throughout the Environmental Assessment process and beyond.
