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**Re: NWB2MEA0204 - Meadowbank Site Abandonment and Restoration
Commitment - per KIA Lease Agreement - July 02**


On behalf of Environment Canada, I have reviewed the additional documentation associated with this file. Generally, both the Environmental Terms and Conditions - Schedule "C" and the Environmental Action Plan "D" are thorough documents.

Environment Canada has two questions for the proponent. Regarding section 1.1.3 of the Environmental Action Plan "Remove Fuel Drums", does the proponent intend to conduct the crushing of the drums on top of an impermeable geotextile liner or tarp? Given that there will likely be residual fuel in the drums it would be best to conduct this crushing over top of something that can contain the fuel to avoid contaminating a new site. In Section 3.4 "Burned Sites", Environment Canada's concerns are in regards to the incomplete combustion of materials, such as plastics, or the burning of other materials, such as preserved woods, which may release contaminants into the air. The proponent should identify a detailed list of materials which can appropriately be burned and ensure that this is distributed to all those working on the burning activities. In addition to this, Environment Canada is uncertain of the site details, however with burning described as one of the means to eliminate materials, the proponent should be aware of the surface upon which burning is being conducted. For example, if peat is present, the proponent must be aware of the possibilities of causing a "peat fire", or if permafrost is present the proponent must consider the issues associated with degrading the underlying permafrost layer and the possible impacts that this will have on site reclamation.

Environment Canada would be interested in receiving the site monitoring reports from the proponent via the KIA.
