- Those observing wildlife are required to inform others working in the area and relevant Peregrine
 managers, including Peregrine's Regulatory and Environmental Affairs Manager, of the presence of
 wildlife and/or critical wildlife habitat; and
- Those observing wildlife are required to record each wildlife observation and/or critical wildlife habitat sighting in the Wildlife Log, which is posted in a common area in camp and transmitted electronically to relevant Peregrine Managers, including Peregrine's Regulatory and Environmental Affairs Manager, periodically during that season and at conclusion of the seasonal programme.

By implementing the mitigation measures of documenting and informing others of wildlife and critical wildlife habitat, Peregrine seeks to minimise potential impacts, focus the environmental baseline surveys and facilitate discussions with Aboriginal knowledge-holders.

3.0 WILDLIFE MITIGATION

Negative effects to wildlife and wildlife habitat from the project can be avoided and/or minimised with adherence to established mitigation practices and procedures. Peregrine has identified the following as potentially having impacts to wildlife: Traffic flow (including aircraft and all-terrain vehicles), terrain alteration which may affect habitat, waste and food storage/disposal, and deliberate wildlife harassment. The terms and conditions recommended to protect wildlife and wildlife habitat mirror those outlined in Peregrine's existing permit and licence in order to provide a comprehensive mitigation list.

The following measures serve to minimise or avoid potential impacts to wildlife:

- Give wildlife the right-of-way;
- Travel restricted to designated, appropriately-signposted overland travel trails;
- Overland travel restricted to the winter season when the ground is sufficiently frozen to avoid vegetation and soil disturbances;
- Restrict aircraft activities to a minimum altitude of 610 m above ground level where there are
 occurrences of wildlife (taking account first and foremost of pilot and crew safety during poor
 weather, winds, and/or visibility), unless there is a specific survey requirement for low-level flights. In
 the case of a wildlife survey, the activity is conducted via an approved government Wildlife Research
 Permit;
- Maintain a vertical distance of 1,000 m and a horizontal distance of 1,500 m between aircraft and large concentrations of birds. In the case of a wildlife survey, the activity is conducted via an approved Wildlife Research Permit. As stated in Peregrine's ongoing Protocol for Flying/Sampling in, or in Proximity to, a Canadian Key Migratory Bird Site¹, "Fly high whenever possible. Where human safety does not dictate otherwise, maintain a minimum flight altitude of 650 m over important habitat."
