Re: Notice of Part 4 Screening for Tundra Copper Corporation's "Coppermine-Exploration" project proposal

Dear Nigel Luckman:

On March 5, 2015 the NIRB received Tundra Copper Corporation's (Tundra Copper) "Coppermine-Exploration" project proposal from Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada (AANDC). The NIRB notes that a conformity determination from the Nunavut Planning Commission was not required for this file as the proposed project is within a region that does not have an approved land use plan (Kitikmeot region).

Following a preliminary completeness check, the NIRB determined that the proposal as submitted did not contain sufficient information for the NIRB to permit proper screening. On March 20, 2015 the NIRB requested that Tundra Copper provide additional information in support of this proposal by March 30, 2015. On March 31, 2015 the NIRB received the requested additional information to proceed with the screening.

The proposed project is located approximately 24 to 90 kilometres southwest to west-southwest of Kugluktuk. Tundra Copper is proposing to conduct a multi-year program to explore for copper mineralization using geochemical soil and rock sampling surveys, prospecting, diamond drilling and geological mapping. During the 2015 season, Tundra Copper would evaluate and verify previously discovered copper deposits by drilling 28 holes for a total of 4,800 metres on Inuit Owned Land and Crown Land between June 1, 2015 and August 15, 2015. In addition, based on what is discovered in 2015, exploration would continue in 2016 and 2017.

The proposed project activities would include:

- Camp and supplies brought to Kugluktuk from Yellowknife and transported to proposed airstrip site via helicopter. In addition, the helicopter would be used to transport personal and equipment to drill locations;
- Use of existing airstrip for resupply of food, fuel and personnel;
- Use of existing fuel storage area adjacent to the airstrip for up to 100-205 litre (L) diesel drums, 4-205 L gasoline drums, 100-205 L Aviation fuel drums and 6-100 pound (lbs) propane cylinders in lined berms or stands as required;
- Use of all-terrain vehicles (ATV) to transport supplies and personnel from the airstrip to proposed camp site;
- Establishment of a temporary camp for 12 to 14 persons on a historical camp location with generator;
- Use of water from nearby lake or stream for both the camp and drilling activities;
- Disposal of sludge (drill cuttings and water) would be disposed of in sumps as appropriate;
- Burying of sewage with lime and organic matter/soil that would be set aside and backfilled when use of the sump is complete;
- Filtering of greywater would be filtered through grease traps and disposed of in sumps;
- Burning of combustible wastes and non-combustible wastes would be flown from site and disposed of appropriately; and
- Storing of hazardous waste in sealed containers in a lined berm until flown from site for proper treatment and disposal.

The NIRB is copying parties and municipalities potentially affected by Tundra Copper's project proposal with this letter, and we invite interested parties to comment directly to the NIRB by May 4, 2015.

The NIRB would like parties to provide comments regarding:

- Whether the project proposal is likely to arouse significant public concern; and if so, why;
- Whether the project proposal is likely to cause significant adverse eco-systemic and socio-economic effects; and if so, why;
- Whether the project is of a type where the potential adverse effects are highly predictable and mitigable with known technology, (please provide any recommended mitigation measures); and
- Any matter of importance to the Party related to the project proposal.
