All land-based drill cuttings are pumped to a sump which is either a natural depression or a dyke that is temporarily deployed, both of which trap the drill cuttings and allow the water to drain away. The drill cuttings are then re-habilitated with peat moss and fertilizer. Ice based drill cuttings will be collected in tanks and removed to land based sump

20. Describe what will be done with drill water?

All land based drilling fluids will be treated in sumps to collect cuttings, allowing the water to drain into the surrounding landscape. Ice based drill water will be tanks and pump to a suitable land based depression and allowed to drain
