

Kiyuk Lake Gold Project Executive Summary Amendment April 22, 2016

Location and Description of Undertaking

Northern Empire's long term goal is to continue the evaluation of the Kiyuk Lake Project, located 350 km southwest of Arviat, NU.

The minimum and maximum latitude/longitude coordinates of the property boundary remain the same:

North 60°28"42" West 100°30'58" Camp coordinates 60°27'49" 100°23'05"

South 60°23'15" East 100°16'51"

As of April 2016, Northern Empire Resources Corp. does not have any plans to conduct any field work because slow market conditions make it very difficult to find investors. This request for renewal is to keep the Property's water licence in good standing so that further exploration is possible should market conditions improve. Permitted activities include prospecting, diamond drilling, rock, soil and till sampling and baseline environmental studies.

Water use and quantity

The total volume of water authorized under the current licence is 160m³/day for both camp operations and drilling requirements.

<u>Waste</u>

Combustible waste will be incinerated on site and non-combustible waste will be backhauled to Manitoba.

Other persons or properties affected by the undertaking

There are no known persons or properties that will be adversely affected by the proposed undertaking.

Predicted environmental impacts of the undertaking and proposed mitigation measures

Although no field work is planned at this time, progressive reclamation will be implemented whereby every site will be reclaimed by ensuring that it is properly cleaned and that all equipment, debris and fuel is removed and the site is restored and left in a condition whereby natural re vegetation can occur.

Water used at drill sites is deposited into a sump located, at minimum, 31 m away from any water body and in a depression. Camp grey water is collected in a sump which is located several hundred metres from any surrounding waterbodies. All waste is transported off site for disposal.

Water Rights

This proposed undertaking would not impact the quality and quantity of waters.

Proposed time schedule

At this time, Northern Empire has no plans to conduct further field work because challenging market conditions make it difficult to find financial support.
