Technical Review Memorandum

Amendment Application

Background:

On July 6th, 2010, Agnico-Eagle Mines Ltd (AEM) completed a take over of Comaplex Minerals Corp. (now a wholly owned subsidiary of AEM). AEMs acquisitions included both the Meliadine West and Meliadine East Projects.

Comaplex has requested an amendment to the above noted water licence for an increase in water use from 30 $\rm m^3$ / day to 299 $\rm m^3$ /day, citing the additional water is required to run 5 drills with the capacity for consuming up to 53 $\rm m^3$ /day of water.

In addition to a more comprehensive drilling program, AEM has removed and relocated the existing camp and majority of related infrastructure permitted via licence 2BE-MEP0913 to the Meliadine West site, which is permitted by 2BB-MEL0914. No staff will be housed on the Meliadine East Property.

In concert with the amendment application, AEM has submitted an updated 'Abandonment and Restoration Plan' and a 'Spill Contingency Plan' which AEM has indicated will apply to both water licences (2BB-MEL0914 and 2BE-MEL0813).

On November 18, 2010 in Yellowknife, AEM made a presentation which indicated that the 2011 bulk sample program would focus on "extracting a bulk sample that is more representative of the entire Tiriganiaq deposit' which is located on the Meliadine West property, under the 2BB-MEL0914 licence.

Additionally, timelines were presented which reflected mine construction beginning in 2013, and production start up in 2015.

Comaplex has applied for an increased use of water under their Meliadine East water licence citing that activities on this mineral claim will occur to confirm mineral resources.

The application also states that in 2009, Meliadine East was purchased by Comaplex with the intent of developing the Discovery Gold deposit as part of the



larger Meliadine Gold Project. The application refers to the name of this project as 'the Meliadine Gold Project, formerly Meliadine East'.

Whereas AEM is looking to conduct a more expansive drilling programme on its Meliadine East and West Projects, it would appear that drilling activities are occurring on 2 sites for the purposes of carrying out one project. Additionally, AEM would be in possession of 2 water licences which would collectively permit the use of 589 m³/ day of water.

Recommendations / Comments

NIRB Screening:

A review of the NIRB screening for the Meliadine West proposed bulk sample revealed that the only property included in the screening was drill locations related to water licence 2BB-MEL0914 on the Meliadine West Project area.

Comaplex has applied to the NWB for an amendment to their water licence 2BE-MEP for use of water up to 299 m3/day to operate 5 additional drills on the Meliadine East property.

Accordingly, INAC has concerns that drilling activities proposed for the Meliadine East site have not been included as part of the original NIRB screening of the proposed bulk sample.

Summary:

In summary, INAC has the following concerns:

- The application refers to the name of this project as 'the Meliadine Gold Project, formerly Meliadine East', thereby inferring that the 2 properties (Meliadine East and West) should now be considered one. The proponent should clarify if the Meliadine West and East projects should be considered one larger project, or two separate projects.
- The proposed, combined water use for the 2 licences would be 589 m³/day, well in excess of the threshold for a Type B licence.
- It is not clear where the proposed drilling locations are on the Meliadine East property and the amount of drilling that will occur in relation to the discovery deposit for which the amendment was requested. The proponent must provide proposed drill locations, and include GPS coordinates.
- Uncertainty surrounding the scope of the previously screened project is of concern. If activities related to Meliadine East (water licence 2BE-MEP0813) were not included in the original NIRB screening, this should be addressed prior to the NWB considering the amendment application.

INAC recommends that the above noted information must be submitted prior to the Board considering the amendment application. As such, INAC would like to respectfully recommend that the Board consider the amendment application premature until certainty around the items of concern noted above, particularly confirmation of scope/NIRB screenings and the appropriateness of a Type B water licence can be fully addressed.
