If the information requested has already been provided in a specific document or report, please indicate the section of that document or report where the response can be found.

It is in Hornby Bay's best interest to cure the above deficiencies in a timely manner. Failure to address the deficiencies before NIRB resumes the screening process may result in the Project Proposal being returned for clarification in accordance with the Nunavut Land Claims Agreement (NLCA) Section 12.4.4 (c). If Hornby Bay determines that the time required to cure the deficiencies is *significantly greater* than

2 weeks, NIRB advises that Hornby Bay consider canceling their Project Proposal application with INAC and NIRB and re-filing their Project Proposal with the requested information. If Hornby Bay determines that the deficiencies can be cured within a reasonable time period, NIRB advises Hornby Bay to notify NIRB on or before **February 22, 2006** of the expected submission date. If no further information or notification is received by NIRB before **February 22, 2006**, NIRB shall resume the screening process at Hornby Bay's own risk.
