Commander Resources Inc. ("Commander") has reviewed the comments provided from Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada ("CIRNAC") and Environment and Climate Change Canada regarding the Dewar Lakes Camp proposed Nunavut Water Board ("NWB") water licence 2BE-NAD1722 renewal.

Commander would like to express our appreciation for the time these agencies spent reviewing the proposed amendment to the water licence and providing their comments.

Response to CIRNAC

1. Confirmation that Only 2 m3/day of Water is Needed

In 2018, the last time the camp was utilized, the daily water consumption average was 0.35 m³/day for 10 personnel. Therefore it anticipated that 2 m³/day for 20 a maximum of 20 personnel should be sufficient. To clarify the maximum 20 personnel would not be anticipated to occupy the camp for an entire filed project, but would more likely be for a short additional program or Property visit.

2. Location of Camp Infrastructure Unclear with Relation to Water Bodies

All camp infrastructure, including tents, metal silo and incinerator, as well as materials, chemicals, fuel, and waste will always be stored and used a minimum 31 meters away from the high watermark of any waterbody (aside from a water pump which will be in secondary containment beside the water source) as has been done in the past. See attached 2017 inspection report "170926 2BE-NAD1722 IQALUIT-#1176605-v1-FIELD_OPS_-_1718_WATER_INSPECTION_REPORT."

3. Missing MSDS for Cleaning Products

As it is uncertain exactly what chemicals may be required for cleaning purposes, the MSDS sheets will be updated in the Dewar Lakes Camp Spill Prevention and Response Plan when the next field program commences once all chemicals are identified.
