## **Background**


Prince Leopold Island is located off the Northeastern tip of Somerset Island in Nunavut and has the distinction of being a migratory bird sanctuary. The Canadian Wildlife Service branch of Environment Canada has a migratory bird monitoring station/site on Prince Leopold Island. This site has been in use periodically since 1975. It is used for monitoring marine birds during the breeding season (summer months). The site consists of two buildings (living quarters and an outhouse). The living quarters can accommodate 4 people for two months.

The following items are noted as outstanding requirements of the water license and the annual report

- 1) GPS Coordinates/Locations of sumps used for wastes.
- 2) Daily quantities of water used.
- Spill Plan has to include all items in Part H Item 1 of the water license.
- 4) Abandonment and Restoration Plan as per Part I of the water license.
- 5) Water Monitoring as per Part J of the water license.
- 6) List of any unauthorized discharges or spills. If none occurred then this should be stated in the Annual Report.

The Canadian Wildlife Service should provide the Nunavut Water Board all outstanding information referred to above in order to comply with the requirements of Part B Item 1 of the water license.
