Background Coral Harbour Additions to the Sewage discharge area

The Hamlet of Coral Harbour is gravely concerned about the sighting of numerous Caribou drinking and cating liquid and solids from initial wetlands area of the sewage treatment area The photographs attached indicate the winter conditions in this area and the areas where caribou are digging to drink the warm liquid in sub zero weather conditions. It is important to local people and all the caribou meat that is exported to Europe there is no risk to human or animal health. Therefore this initial sewage wetlands area must be fenced to climinate these habits of the caribou

Community Government and Transportation have developed a project to contain the sewage that is discharged from October 1st until June 15 of each year. This project includes a 1.0 TO 1.5 Metre high berm and with a 2 metre high chain like fence in the centre of the berm that surrounds the sewage discharge area. The warm sewage that is discharged all winter long will no longer be available to the caribou. During each summer from June 15th to October 1 the sewage will be allowed to gradually docant onto a new large wetlands area directly east of the sewage discharge lagoon. This will allow for improved biological degradation action as the sewage wetlands treatment area is increased.

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
