




year licence would be to their benefit, we would suggest that the board give consideration to a issuing a shorter term licence (say 4 or 5 years) which will allow the community and the department to undertake the various studies as mentioned above and provide a plan of action to upgrade municipal facilities.

In accordance with the department's letter to the Nunavut Impact Review Board dated May 29, 2000 (copy of which has been provided to you), we note that the Hamlet has not indicated that there is a potential of establishing a tannery in the community (refer to Section IV of the Supplementary Questionnaire – Commerical, Industrial and/or Hazardous Wastes) or that it is not the intention of disposing of tannery effluent in to the sewage lagoon. In accordance with the above mentioned letter, should it be the case to dispose of tannery effluent into the sewage lagoon, we would have some serious concerns.

Lastly, the Department of Community Government and Transportation is in the process of completing a multi-year capital plan. As of now, there are no firm plans for capital projects in any communities.
