

- All spills of oil, fuel or other deleterious materials shall be reported immediately to the 24-hour Spill Line at (867) 920-8130.

**General Comments**

DFO-HM recommends the Northern Remote Site Protocols be consulted when dealing with the grey water and sewage disposal. The business proposal indicates sumps for grey water and sewage will be used in every scenario. This totals 8 septic pits! In the spirit of the Remote Site Protocols the proponents may want to consider more environmentally sound practices for their waste management.

The business proposal identifies incineration for the method of garbage disposal and "...recycling will be used according to local regulations." Could the proponent be more specific and include a copy of the "local regulations".

DFO-HM recommends that non-biodegradable material be flown out at every opportunity rather than storing it on site until the close of the season as outlined in the business proposal. This will decrease the risk of non-biodegradable garbage being left on site due to time constraints after the lodge closes.

Any changes to the proposed operation that may result in any impact on fish or fish habitat must be reported to the Department of Fisheries & Oceans, Iqaluit office before such changes are implemented.

Please note that none of the foregoing should be taken as authorization of the undertaking in accordance with the Fisheries Act or any other legislation.

## ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESOURCES: TERMS AND CONDITIONS

### BACKGROUND

- I. The archaeological record of the Inuit of Nunavut is a record of Inuit use and occupancy of lands and resources through time. The evidence associated with their use and occupancy represents a cultural, historical, and ethnographic heritage of Inuit society and, as such, Government recognizes that Inuit have a special relationship with such evidence which shall be expressed in terms of special rights and responsibilities.

The archaeological record of Nunavut is of spiritual, cultural, religious and educational importance to Inuit. Accordingly, the identification, protection and conservation of archaeological sites and specimens and the interpretation of the archaeological record is of primary importance to Inuit and their involvement is both desirable and necessary.

In recognition of the cultural, spiritual and religious importance of certain areas in Nunavut to Inuit, Inuit have special rights and interests in these areas as defined by Article 33 of Nunavut Land Claim Agreement.

- II. "Archaeological site" means a site or work within Nunavut of archaeological, ethnographical or historical importance, interest or significance or a place where an archaeological specimen is found, and includes explorers' cairns. "Archaeological specimen" means an object or specimen found in an archaeological site of archaeological, ethnological or historical importance, interest or significance and includes explorers' documents.
- III. Any new Terms and Conditions raising issues found in ss. 10 and 16 of the Territorial Land Use Regulations should duplicate statutory sections, or be stricter, but not more lenient in terms of protection of archaeological resources.
- IV.
  1. The permittee shall not operate any vehicle over a known or suspected archaeological site.
  2. The permittee shall not remove, disturb or displace any archaeological specimen or site.
  3. The permittee shall contact the Department of Culture, Language, Elders and Youth, Iqaluit (867-979-4720) and DIAND official should an archaeological site or specimen be encountered or disturbed by any land use activity.
  4. The permittee shall immediately cease any activity which disturbs an archaeological or historical site, encountered during the course of a land use operation, until permitted to proceed with the authorization of the Department of Culture, Language, Elders and Youth.
  5. The permittee shall follow the direction of the Department of Culture, Language, Elders and Youth and DIAND in restoring disturbed archaeological sites to an acceptable condition, and according to the respective jurisdictions and authorities.
  6. The permittee shall provide information to the Department of Culture, Language, Elders and Youth about each archaeological site or specimen encountered by any land use activity, by completing the attached form.
  7. The permittee shall make best efforts to ensure that all persons working under authority of the permit are aware of these conditions concerning archaeological sites and specimens.

CARIBOU PROTECTION MEASURES  
(QAMANIRJUAQ AND BEVERLY HERDS) 1988

1. (a) The Permittee shall not, without approval, conduct any activity between May 15 and July 15 within the Caribou Protection Areas depicted on the map certified by the Engineer as the "Caribou Protection Map" annexed to this Land Use Permit.

(b) A Permittee may, upon approval by the Land Use Inspector, operate within the said Caribou Protection Areas beyond the May 15 deadline set out in 1(a), provided that when monitoring information indicates that caribou cows are approaching the area of operation, the Permittee will implement 1(c).

(c) On cessation of activities pursuant to 1(a) or 1(b), the Permittee will remove all personnel from the zone who are not required for the maintenance and protection of the camp facilities and equipment unless otherwise directed by the Land Use Inspector.

(d) The Permittee may commence or resume activities prior to July 15 within those parts of the Caribou Protection Areas released by the Land Use Inspector for the reason that caribou cows are not expected to use those parts for calving or post-calving (note 1).

2. (a) In the event that caribou cows calve outside of the Caribou Protection Areas, the Permittee shall suspend operations within the area(s) occupied by cows and/or calves between May 15 and July 15. CARIBOU PROTECTION GENERAL

(b) In the event that caribou cows and calves are present the Permittee shall suspend:

- (i) blasting,
- (ii) overflights by aircraft at any altitude of less than 300 metres above ground level, and
- (iii) the use of snowmobiles and ATV's (all-terrain vehicles) outside the immediate vicinity of the camp.

3. (a) During migration of Caribou, the Permittee shall not locate any operation so as to block or cause substantial diversion to migration. CARIBOU PROTECTION MIGRATION

(b) The Permittee shall cease activities that may interfere with migration, such as airborne geophysics surveys or movement of equipment, until the migrating caribou have passed.

4. (a) The Permittee shall not, between May 15 and September 1, construct any camp, cache any fuel or conduct any blasting within 10 km of any "Designated Crossing" as outlined on the map certified by the Engineer as the "Caribou Protection Map" and annexed to this Land Use Permit. CARIBOU CROSSING

(b) The Permittee shall not, between May 15 and September 1, conduct any diamond drilling operation within 5 km of any "Designated Crossing" as outlined on the map certified by the Engineer as the "Caribou Protection Map" and annexed to this Land Use Permit.

NOTE

1. The Land Use Inspector's decision will be based on the existing caribou information.
2. Concentrations of caribou should be avoided by low level aircraft at all times.

**Ennadai Lake Lodge - NIRB 99TN042**

I am responding to your letter, dated June 29<sup>th</sup> 1999 regarding a water licence and land use permit for the proposed Ennadai Lake Lodge, NIRB 99TN042.

I noted the applicant intends to:

- Back-haul non-combustible waste; and
- Construct a concrete containment facility for fuel storage.

These actions are fully supported. As fuel likely represents one of the more hazardous materials on site, the applicant should be encouraged to have other fuel containment and response materials on site such as drip pans at fuel transfer points and absorbent matting for cleaning spills. Such measures represent best environmental practice and are consistent with the objectives of the project, i.e. tourism adventure.

Since this project is intended to be long term, and in excess of 20 people could be on site at a time, the applicant should be encouraged to utilize bio-toilet technology. Utilizing such technology would not only help maintain the quality of the local environment but would also represent a positive measure from a human health perspective.

I also noted the applicant intends to construct septic pits for grey water and sewage. An attempt should be made to design the pits to some engineering standard so they are more than just holes in the ground and can enhance the degradation of organic material and dispersion of liquids.
