

Dear Ms. Beaulieu.

Please accept this letter as my project summary.

As I have plans to utilize the Byron Bay area from mid-August to mid-September annually I do not feel that there is a need for me to submit a project proposal. At this camp there will be a maximum of 12 people occupying the area at one time as it will be for conducting big game hunting for musk oxen and caribou. The guests will also be doing some sport fishing at the camp during their off time as well.

In the future I plan on using the area during the spring hunting season from early March to mid-April but that will not be for a few years and when the time comes I will be requesting any additional licensing requirements.

In the questionnaire you provided I noted that the NPC conformity came through so I am providing a copy of the letter and also I was given a verbal positive reply from the Nunavut Impact Review Board, I was telephoned by Sophia Granchino stating that since it was a camp with under 20 beds I would not have to go through the NIRB process. The Kitikmeot Inuit Association Lands Division will be reviewing my land lease application with the Community Beneficiary Committee (CBC) here in Cambridge Bay and I am awaiting their decision.

The big game and recreational camp to be located at Byron Bay will consist of the following:

4 - 10' X 12' tent frames

3 12' X 16' Weatherhaven tents

I 10' X 12' cabin for storage of the tents

1 moveable out house

Up to 6 (45 gallon) drums of gasoline

2 (45 gallon) drums of fuel oil

Once Kitikmeot Supplies has the propane facility up and running I plan on converting all heaters and stoves to propane.

The camp will be set up on the west shore just at the mouth of the Byron Bay, this area is rarely used by residents of Cambridge Bay however the Kitikmeot Foods utilizes this river for their annual fish harvest of Arctic Char.

Depending on the number of clients booked annually will determine how many tents are set up for the operation.

My plan is to have a maximum of four clients at a time at one week intervals for four weeks beginning after August 15th annually.

At the end of the season when the last client has left there will be a dismantling of the tents for winter storage and I will hire one other person from Cambridge Bay during this time.

The main cost will be gasoline for the boat trip: Cambridge Bay - Byron Bay - Cambridge Bay and my estimate is based on using a four stroke outboard.

1.309 litre X 184 litres = 240.85 for a total of 481.71 for two boats.

At the camp all paper and burnable material will be burned and all non burnable will be brought back to Cambridge Bay at the end of the season.

In regards to bear deterrent I will be contacting the Dep't of Sustainable Development for bear fence set up as they are the experts at this area. I will also have based at the camp a Defender 12 Gauge shotgun with screamers, rubber bullets and shotgun slugs to be used as a last resort.
